

**5.04.19** Fueling his passion for diversity and equality, Barry affixes a rainbow flag to his sword in support of students who organized Burlington County's first Pride Day.


**5.13.19** Barry gains immortality with his first **bobblehead**. In honor of the college's founding year, the bookstore initially sold them for \$19.69.

# RCBC astrophysicist partners with students to revolutionize water safety testing

Imagine being able to test water through a device as universal as your cell phone. That's exactly what Rowan College at Burlington County alumnus John McEvoy did before forming a team who turned the idea into reality.

Under Light Analytics, six students and alumni from RCBC, along with two Rowan University students and their instructor Greg Perugini, created an innovative mobile handheld device that tests the safety of water and provides immediate results. The product, known as the LightAl Mark III, took top honors at the third annual Idea Challenge held at Rowan University.

This was the first time a team comprised mostly of community college students won first place in the competition. Hosted by the Rowan Innovation Venture Fund, the Idea Challenge featured a dozen teams of students, all of whom pitched their best business ideas before an audience of university stakeholders and potential investors. The winning team, led by John McEvoy and Cameron Mikulski,

both of whom transferred to Rowan University from RCBC, won \$7,500 to continue developing their LightAI Mark I

"Water is our foot in the door," says Mikulski. "This work could end up being our future."

# Weisbrod Appointed to National Math Panel





# **50<sup>th</sup> Slogan Contest**





# **2019 Commencement**

Last year, the rain wouldn't let up. This year, the sun shone brightly on our students who graduated on the grassy quad behind RCBC's state-of-the-art Student Success Center. In fact, 2019 marked the first year that RCBC held an outdoor commencement on the grass of the new quad. This year's celebrations highlighted the nearly 50-year history of the school, as well as the diversity of the student population.

"We definitely have a lot to celebrate this year," college President Dr. Michael A. Cioce said. "We have spent half a century transforming lives."

Keynote speakers included former college President **Dr. Robert C. Messina**, who was the longest-serving president from 1987 to 2012, and Deborah Heart and Lung Center CEO **Joseph Chirichella**, who spoke at the Health Sciences ceremony.

The college's graduates came from all walks of life and backgrounds. Nearly 150 RCBC graduates are continuing their education through the college's innovative 3+1 program, which allows students to earn a degree through Rowan University, while attending classes on RCBC's campus at a significantly lower cost. These students are on their way to join the first 92 3+1 students who have saved \$3.3 million while earning their associate and bachelor's degrees.

# Recipe

# Frosted Flake Profiterole with Frosted Flake Cereal Milk Ice Cream

For the Profiterole: For the Ice Cream:

10 oz water 4 oz egg yolks (approx. 6 egg yolks)


4 oz butter 3 oz sugar

1 tsp sugar 8 oz Frosted Flakes Cereal

1 tsp salt 1 pt milk

6 oz bread flour 8 oz heavy cream 6 oz eggs 1 tsp vanilla extract

pinch of salt





- 1. Combine the liquid, butter, sugar and salt in a heavy saucepan. Bring the mixture to a full, rolling boil.
- 2. Remove the pan from the heat and add the flour all at once. Stir quickly.
- 3. Return the pan to moderate heat and stir vigorously until the dough forms a ball and pulls away from the sides of the pan.
- **4.** Transfer the dough to the bowl of a mixer.
- 5. With the paddle attachment, mix at low speed until the dough has cooled slightly. It should be about 140 degrees F, which is still very warm, but not hot to touch.
- 6. At medium speed, beat in the eggs a little at a time. Add no more than a quarter of the eggs at once, and wait until they are completely absorbed before adding more. When all the eggs are absorbed, the paste is ready to use.
- 7. Line sheet pans with parchment. Fit a large pastry bag with a plain tube. Fill the bag with the paste.
- 8. Pipe out round mounds of dough about 1-1/2 inches in diameter onto the lined baking sheets.
- 9. Bake at 425 degrees F for 10 minutes. Lower heat to 375 degrees F until mounds are well browned and very crisp.
- 10. Remove them from the oven and let cool slowly in a warm place.
- 11. After ice cream is made, slice each profiterole in half and fill with a small scoop of the ice cream. Top with the other half. Optional to dust the top with confectioner's sugar/ganache/frosted flakes/chili.

# To make the Ice Cream:

- 1. Pour the cream and milk in a bowl. Add the Frosted Flakes and let sit. Set aside.
- 2. Combine the egg yolks and sugar in a bowl. Whisk until thick and light.
- 3. Take the cream/milk mixture and strain the cereal out of it. Pour this into a pot.
- 4. Using a hot water bath, scald this mixture and gradually beat in the egg mixture, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens enough to coat the back of a spoon.
- 5. Remove from heat, and place in an ice bath to cool. Chill thoroughly.
- **6.** Freeze in an ice cream freezer according to the manufacturer's directions.

Within three years, William Pepe transitioned from being a temporary employee to an executive advisor at Multi-Housing Depot, an apartment and multifamily supplier. His strong work ethic and attention to detail, coupled with his completion of Rowan College at Burlington County's advanced manufacturing courses, paved the way for several growth opportunities in his career.

**"Multi-Housing Depot saw my ability to organize and** schedule workloads in a timely manner and offered me a position to supervise our CNC machining area contingent upon my certification as a maintenance technician. So that's what I did," Pepe recalls.

# Give Kids a **Smile Day**

Let's face it. There isn't much to smile about ir February. It's cold, and there's little to do. That's why February 1 was the perfect day for Rowan College at Burlington County to host our 15th annual **Give Kids** a Smile Day. This one-day program provided free dental care to children ages 12 and younger who may not otherwise have access to oral health care. Give Kids a Smile Day is part of the American Dental Association's national effort to bring attention to the number one childhood disease: tooth decay.

Children received free preventive and emergency dental care, including cleanings, fillings, x-rays and extractions. Barry also made an appearance to give the kids even more to smile about.









# RSVP members provide services exceeding \$425,000 per year to local residents

When considering retirement, some view it through a lens of relaxation and taking a final break from work. Fortunately for the citizens of Burlington County, each year countless seniors vow to take a different approach.

Through the **Retired Senior Volunteer Program** (**RSVP**), established in 1974, members of the 55+ population use their skills, experience and talents to meet the needs and challenges of their local communities. RSVP partners with area non-profit agencies to foster civic engagement and positively impact the community. In fact, RSVP members provide free services (worth more than \$425,000 per year) to Burlington County residents.

RSVP participants impact people from all walks of life. Services include academic and literacy tutoring, health education, financial management assistance, tax preparation and senior citizen companionship. RSVP is funded by the Corporation for National and Community Service and Rowan College at Burlington County.



To promote our agricultural heritage in Burlington County, RCBC partnered with the Burlington County Department of Resource Conservation and the **Seed Library Bank** to open a unique seed library.

Service-Learning scholars helped prepare the seeds that were distributed free of charge and included heirloom seeds that have local connections.

With a better understanding and perspective on education, my children have also been thriving," said Heather Casparro, a May 2018 graduate and 2018–2019 alumni trustee. "As I got myself caught up with my education, I was able to guide my children on the right path. They were able to observe and recognize the importance of educational goals; it painted a bigger picture for them. Straight A's for everyone in this household, mission accomplished, thank you RCBC."

# **Foundation**

Each year, the RCBC Foundation raises money to assist hundreds of students in affording their education through events such as the **Celebration of Philanthropy**, which raised **\$140,000**, and Dress for Success. In partnership with the Workforce Development Institute, Dress for Success provides 12 graduating students with a professional makeover, including attire, haircuts, resume and interview coaching and networking training.


Analyzing data and implementing changes based upon one's findings and not novel ideas. However, when applied to students at risk of dismissal, it can yield life-changing results. That's exactly what happened when, in 2017, Rowan College at Burlington County advisors launched the Academic Contract for Excellence (ACE) program in which they worked closely with students to improve their study skills, time management and

One year later, eighteen struggling students stayed in college, boosted their cumulative GPA's and transferred to four-year schools. In fact, nearly 78% of participants achieved a 3.0 GPA and several even reached perfect 4.0 GPA's.

Amani Edwards, of Willingboro, is one of the program's success stories. In high school, Edwards was among the top 15 percent of her class, which earned her free tuition through the NJ STARS program. Her goal of transferring to a historically black college to study nursing was stifled after struggling in some math and science courses sending her GPA below the 2.0 requirement for graduation.



Edwards entered ACE in fall 2017 with a 1.77 GPA and graduated in 2018 with a 2.712 GPA.


